SUPPORTING COUNTRIES TO ESTABLISH MECHANISMS TO MONITOR HUMAN RIGHTS IN MENTAL HEALTH FACILITIES

The role of WHO

- Human rights violations in mental health facilities are an everyday occurrence in many countries. The lack of resources devoted to mental health, a "dehumanization" of people with mental disabilities and the poor level of knowledge and understanding about human rights means that mental health facilities are associated with a wide range of abuses. Unhygienic and inhuman living conditions are common in many facilities, as are inadequate, degrading and harmful treatment practices. Many people being unjustifiably admitted to facilities against their will and languish there for weeks, months and sometimes even years at a time. Informed consent to treatment is systematically ignored in many establishments and patients are administered (sometimes harmful or irreversible) treatment despite having the capacity to make treatment decisions. In other cases, people are neglected altogether and receive no treatment or care whatsoever. Basic rights such as the right to confidentiality, to access information, to privacy, to communication, are frequently violated.
- Mechanisms to monitor human rights in mental health facilities are crucial. Yet few countries have established such mechanisms.


Monitoring mechanisms are needed to:

- Ensure that *voluntary* admission and treatment is being promoted
- Review all cases of involuntary admission and treatment
- Make sure that involuntary procedures meet international human rights standards and are being respected
- Review appeals against involuntary admission and treatment orders

And also to:

- Conduct regular inspections of mental health facilities
- Monitor that living conditions are acceptable
- Ensure that people are receiving the treatment and care they need and that their human rights are being respected.

The Role of WHO

WHO is working to support countries in establishing mechanisms to monitor the rights of people with mental disabilities in mental health facilities.

WHO TOOL KIT FOR MONITORING THE HUMAN RIGHTS OF PEOPLE WITH MENTAL DISABILITIES

WHO is developing an instrument for helping countries establish human rights monitoring mechanisms. The tool kit will comprise information and guidance on:

- Mechanisms for monitoring, promoting and protecting the rights of people with mental disabilities at the international, regional and national level;
- Setting up visiting boards, conducting inspections and assessing and evaluating human rights standards and conditions in mental health facilities;
- Setting up mental health review bodies and reviewing and assessing cases of involuntary admissions and treatment.

➡ TECHNICAL SUPPORT TO COUNTRIES

Support to countries involves:

- Establishing national visiting boards and review bodies to monitor the rights of people in mental health facilities;
- Providing training and capacity building on how to assess, evaluate and report on human rights conditions in mental health facilities, using the Tool Kit;
- Providing guidance on implementation strategies to improve human rights and treatment conditions in mental health facilities.
